On Friday, May 1, 2020, Governor Cuomo, as part of Executive Order 202.26, made provisions to the Election Law, Education Law, and Village Law with respect to budget voting and annual elections. Specifically for school districts, the Executive Order rescheduled the annual meeting to Tuesday, June 9, 2020, and has required that all voting must be done by absentee ballot.

Based on the enacted state budget, the district is proposing a budget of \$13,405,200. However, it is important to note that the proposed budget might not be the complete spending plan of the district; spending may actually be drastically reduced. Within the state budget bills there is a mechanism that authorizes the Governor's Budget Director to develop a plan to reduce local assistance spending in the event the revenues are estimated to be 1% below projections or expenditures are more than 1% above projections during each of three "measurement periods" (April 30, June 30, or December 31). Therefore, throughout the 2020-2021 school year, the district may lose anticipated state aid, and as a result, proportionally reduce spending to correspond with the reduction in aid.

In addition to the proposed budget, community members will vote on a vehicle purchase proposition to purchase one (1) 66-passenger bus and a one (1) passenger van for a total not to exceed \$150,000; and to elect a member of the Board of Education to a five-year term beginning July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2025.

On behalf of the faculty, staff, administration, and members of the Board of Education, I would like to thank the community of Hartford for their patience and support throughout the period of closure. The statewide closure of schools and the delivery of remote instruction has turned everyone's lives upside down. However, the level of support and engagement from the community has been tremendous and the district is especially grateful.

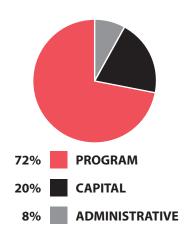

2020-2021 SCHOOL BUDGET

- Administrative expenditures are all the costs associated with district supervision.
- The Administrative expenses are approximately 8% of the overall budget.
- Program expenditures are all the costs directly related to student instruction, including instructional salaries and health benefits.
- The Program expenses are approximately 72% of the overall budget.
- Capital expenditures are all the costs associated with the maintenance of the district facilities.
- The Capital expenses are approximately 20% of overall budget.



School Districts receive revenue through three primary sources:

- 1. Property Taxes
- 2. State Aid
- 3. Miscellaneous Funds
 - State Aid is made up of Foundation Aid and Expense Driven Aid.
 - ✓ Foundation Aid is an unrestricted aid category provided to all school districts in New York State.
 - ✓ Expense Driven Aid is monies that the district will receive based on our prior year spending. Items that fall within the category of expense driven aid are: textbooks, software, hardware and technology, and library.
 - Miscellaneous Funds consist of monies the district will receive through grants, Medicaid reimbursement, etc.

TAX LEVY CAP

When the New York State Tax Levy Cap law was signed in 2011, it was the general understanding that school districts could not increase their tax levy amount by more than 2% without a "Super majority" of votes – thus the common refrain "2% Tax Cap." In truth, under the Tax Cap Law, a school district's allowable growth is determined using a complex, nine-step formula that begins by using the assumption that growth is limited to the lesser of 2% or the Consumer Price Index (CPI). When developing the 2020-2021 school budget, the district's assigned growth factor was 1.0051%. Factoring in the allowable exemptions to the Tax Cap, the Hartford Central School District was determined to have an allowable levy increase of 1.74%, which is below 2%. Since the tax cap law was enacted, I am proud to report that the district has never once sought to exceed the cap and, in fact, has been below our allowable threshold.

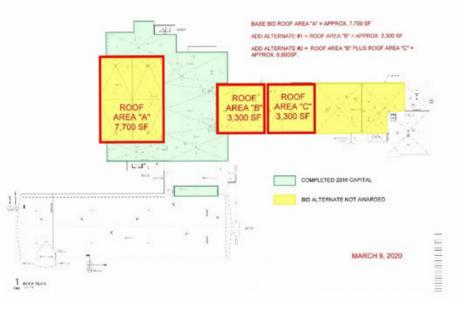

TRANSFER TO CAPITAL PROJECT



New York State law allows for school districts to complete base year capital projects with costs up to \$100,000 through voter approval of the budget. These projects are referred to as "Transfer to Capital" projects and, if approved by the budget vote, these projects are not subject to the lengthy assumed amoritization schedule or elongated review by the Office of Faciliteis Planning. These small scale capital projects help school districts to undertake minor, but important projects, on a yearly basis without having to combine itmes for a large-scale capital project. Across the state, many of the Transfer to Capital Project submissions address areas that have been eliminated from large-scale Capital Projects due to cost, or are items



that have been identified in the Building and Condition Survey.

Within the 2020-2021 budget, the District is proposing to include a Transfer to Capital line to address the roof above the gymnasium which was orginally included in the \$3.9million capital project but removed due to cost.

During the 2019-2020 school-year, the district completed a Transfer to Capital project that addressed masonry work around the building and is scheduled to receive State Aid on the project during the 2020-2021 school year so our net cost for a \$100,000 project is under \$15,000.
